Coming Home

oming home can take place in many varied ways. Sometimes it's at the end of a long day when we come home to where we can be ourselves without any pretentions. Sometimes it's going back to the neighborhood we grew up in, to the old haunts that remind us of the dreams we had and how they now seem tucked in every niche. Sometimes coming home is what happens after many wanderings, after we've sown our oats and harvested little and now have nowhere else to go. That too is a coming home, back to where it all began, back to where we dare to hope that life might begin again.

All of this is how the Hebrew people found themselves coming home to Jerusalem after eighty years of exile, coming back to start anew with the hope that their God would once again be proud of them, back to where they could be as God intended them to be. All of that is what we do when we decide we will try to be the sort of person we'd always hoped to become. It's when we attempt a second effort at making a marriage work, or a job productive, or maybe simply putting the pieces of our lives back in some sort of order. It's all about coming back home to God's dream for us, a kind of second Advent, when God comes into our lives and is born once again.


Last but not least, 34 doz. muffins were collected for Sacred Heart School. Thank you to our members and parishioners who have been faithful to this mission each month.



OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, patroness of all the Americas, and primary intercessor for the unborn, is celebrated on December 12.

Most of us have heard about Our Lady of Guadalupe, the beautiful lady with native features, skin coloring and dark hair and dress, who appeared to the poor Aztec Indian Juan Diego in December of 1531 in Guadalupe, Mexico. She told him that she was the ever-virgin Mary, mother of the true God and that she desired a church in this place where his people could experience her compassion. She told him to go to the bishop and tell him all that he had seen and heard.

The bishop didn't believe Juan Diegobut after he came to the bishop a second time, the bishop told Juan to ask the lady for a sign as proof of who she was. She told Juan to go to the top of the hill and pick the roses he found there and take them to the bishop. He did so, carrying them in his tilma, a poncho-like cape made of cactus fibre.

When he went back to the bishop and opened his tilma to remove the flowers there also was the image of the Blessed Virgin imprinted on it. The bishop fell to his knees and believed. A church was built, enlarged, and now a basilica where the tilma with Our Lady's image is framed and on display in what is now Mexico City. Within six years of this apparition, six million Aztecs had converted to Catholicism. The tilma shows Mary as the Godbearer - she is pregnant with her Divine Son.

Many scientists have examined the miraculous tilma's image of Our Lady of Guadalupe, including from NASA using infrared photography and digital enhancement techniques. Here are a few interesting findings about the image:

- It is proven not to be painted by human hands. No natural or animal mineral colorings, or paint, are found on it. The image itself is iridescent, and cannot be produced by hand; the method used to create the image is still unknown.
- The image and fabric have miraculously lasted in the original condition for nearly 500 years. The weak cactus fiber, of which the tilma was made, should have decomposed within 15-20 years of being woven.

- On Mary's neck is a small black cross, identifying her with the Catholic missionary priests and over her womb on her dress is a four-petal flower—the Aztec symbol of life and divinity. A doctor once heard a heartbeat coming from the image when he placed a stethoscope over the womb.
- In the image Mary is "clothed with the sun" with "the moon at her feet" as described in Revelation 12:1. Mary stands on a crescent moon, the same crescent moon that was in the sky on the day of her apparition.
- Her mantle is a constellation map, the same constellations that were in the sky as on the day of her apparition, but looking from outside the universe, a reverse image.
- The constellations tell the story of the Gospel with the arrangement of "Leo" in the womb of "Virgo".
 Our Lady's garment is a topographic map of the geographic location of her apparition.
- Mary's eyes on the Image have the refractory characteristics of human eyes. When examined through a microscope, they reflect the images of the witnesses present at the tilma's unveiling, including Juan Diego and the bishop.

There, of course, have been nay-sayers, mainly that there was no written documentation of the apparition from the 1600's.

Advent Recollection: Reconciliation, Adoration, and Healing



An Advent Examination of Conscience



I will praise you, Lord, with all my heart.
I will delight and rejoice in you. (Ps 9:2-3)

- Am I loving and serving God with my heart, mind, and strength? Or have I become the slave of something else? What is that other thing? How can I change this situation?
- Have I given priority to God on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation by attending Mass and making a special effort to seek a stronger relationship with Christ and His Church?
- When at Mass have I <u>actively participated</u> in true worship of God? Do I pray, sing and pay attention?
- Do I appreciate the great gift of the Eucharist and the many other treasures of my Catholic faith? Do I prepare to receive Holy Communion worthily?
- Do I give Jesus Christ a say in the way I spend my time, money, and other resources? Am I using these gifts to build His kingdom? Have I <u>supported</u> my local parish and its ministries and work?
- Do I <u>show respect</u> for God's holy name and for all that is holy. Do I curse or swear? Have I spoken badly about God's holy Church, its beliefs and priests?

Rejoice in hope, endure in affliction, and persevere in prayer. (Rom 12:12)

- Have I been faithful to prayer, meditation and Scripture reading, opening myself to God's love and direction every day?
- Do I seek to grow in knowledge of Christian faith through study and prayerful meditation?
 Have I sought to <u>form my conscience</u> according to the teachings of the Gospel and the Church?
- Do I <u>pray regularly</u> for others, our beloved dead, the needs of the church and the world?
- Have I allowed myself to slide into sinful habits out of boredom, inattention, laziness, or frustration? Am I praying and working to break the power of these habits?
- What trials and difficulties are causing me the most pain right now? Am I keeping faith and trusting in God and his promises?

To practice justice is a joy for the just. (Prov. 21:15)

- How am I working for the coming of Christ's kingdom of justice and peace?
- Is God calling me to take a stand against some particular injustice? Have I sought His
 guidance about how to respond to the many challenges and issues of our modern society?
- Am I helping to build a world where human life is valued and respected through all stages of life? Have I <u>defended the rights</u> of the unborn, the old and the disabled in my speech, my actions or my participation in the democratic process?
- Have I stolen anything or cheated on my income taxes? Do I need to make restitution for such acts?

• How have I <u>helped care</u> for the poor, less fortunate, sick, and suffering? Have I readily hared with those in need from the many blessings that God has given me?

Complete my joy by being of the same mind, with the same love, united in heart. (Phil 2:2)

- How am I doing in my relationships with the people God is calling me to love and serve; family members, friends, coworkers, neighbors, fellow parishioners? Am I treating them with respect and compassion?
- Have I <u>encouraged</u>, either actively or through my silence, another to sin? Am I living up to my Christian responsibility to help others whom I know are in sinful relationships or addicted to sinful habits?
- Are there ways in which my words, attitudes, or actions have caused disunity in my relationships? Have I **gossiped** and hurt the good name and reputations of others. Why do I do this? What restitution have I made in such circumstances?
- Have I always **spoken the truth**? Have I kept secrets and promises? Have I divulged the hidden sins of others?
- Am I harboring any anger, resentment, hatred or prejudice against someone? Is there anyone I need to forgive? Is there anyone whose forgiveness I need to ask?
- If I am married, how am I working at loving and supporting my spouse and building my marriage? As a parent, do I **give good example** and direction to my children in Christian living?
