## **Bringing Outsiders In**

s a child, were you teased, bullied, chosen last for a team? Did you feel apart from the in-crowd? If so, in various ways this treatment may have kept you from being fully engaged with the larger community, possibly continuing to scar you in even your grown-up world.

In 2021, the news media reported that a Louisiana cemetery refused burial for Darrell Semien because he was black. Though he had served his community as a deputy sheriff for fifteen years and had helped raise seventy-two foster children, none of that was of any significance. After the news broke, the cemetery quickly lifted its whitesonly stipulation, but the damage had been done. In so many ways, we continue to exclude others from the human

Our Sunday Gospel tells of Jesus curing a leper, enabling the man to again become part of the community. Even more startling, by touching him, Jesus himself became "impure," and thus isolated himself from the community, thereby switching roles with the man. Bringing others into community even at a cost to ourselves is divine.

Such compassion is exemplified when people work to reform prisons, seek to integrate immigrants into national life, give voice to the voiceless, improve mental health care, strive to alleviate paralyzing poverty, and more. The world witnessed compassion at its finest during the COVID-19 pandemic when medical personnel worked to heal the sick, even at the cost of isolating themselves from their own families. Compassion toward those in need is holy.

## FAQ: Who wrote the First Catechism known as the Didache?

The author's name does not appear anywhere in the text and could be more than one person and the writer is often referred to as "the Didachist". The author was likely someone with a good knowledge of Jewish Scripture. Clayton N. Jefford, an associate professor at St. Meinrad School of Theology, suggests that "the Didachist was an early Jewish Christian whose religious perspective was still closely allied with the synagogue and traditional Jewish beliefs." Liturgically, we now see green, and we tell the children, "Green is for growing time." The children here have a growing relationship with Jesus. They want to know "Who is God?" The people of Israel wanted to know "Who are you, Jesus?"

Both questions He answers in this one parable. Jn 10:3b-16 "[The Good Shepherd] calls his own sheep by name [...] I came that they might have life [...] I lay down my life for the sheep. [...] I am the Good Shepherd..." The child who hears this may know already or she may wonder for a period of time who these happy sheep might be. But once that point is reached of independently realizing who exactly it is that the Good Shepherd knows and loves in such a way, it is then that without a doubt the wonder only increases!

#### **LENT AND HOLY WEEK CELEBRATIONS OF 2024**

Lent is the Church's communal celebration of its conversion in Jesus Christ. Lent has a double purpose. It is the time when the Catechumens prepare to celebrate their Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. Secondly, it invites those who are already baptized to prepare, through penance and prayer, to renew their Baptismal vows at the Easter Vigil or on Easter Sunday.

Through forty days of closer attention to Sacred Scripture, of more fervent prayer, of frequent reception of the sacraments, and through acts of charity, the faithful prepare to celebrate Christ's death and resurrection.

Among Christians fasting is a penitential discipline intended to open our hearts to God and to others.

As usual and continuing through the Lenten season, the Rosary will be recited one half hour prior to all masses.

Each Friday during Lent parishioners are invited to attend the *Poor Man's Supper* at 5:30pm sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. *Stations of the Cross* and Mass follow respectively at 6:45pm and approximately 7:00pm on February 16. (No morning masses on Fridays during Lent.)

#### **Ash Wednesday**

In Canada *Ash Wednesday* and *Good Friday* are days of fast and abstinence. Ashes will be distributed after the homily at the 7:00pm Mass on Wednesday, February 14. Burning of the old palms for ashes will be at 6:45 pm on Tuesday, February 13. All are welcome to attend.

#### Rite of Election

#### **Lenten Penitential Celebration**

Celebration of the *Sacrament of Reconciliation* punctuates the Lenten season and should be completed before the Triduum begins with the Evening *Mass of Holy Thursday*.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is offered one half hour before regularly scheduled Sunday masses.

The Holy Cross Parish Reconciliation will be on Thursday, March 7 at 7:00 pm.

#### **Chrism Mass**

The Archdiocesan *Chrism Mass* will be held at Holy Rosary Cathedral on Monday, March 18 at 2:00pm. Priests of the Archdiocese will renew their commitment, and the three Holy Oils will be blessed and distributed to pastors and parish representatives. All are welcome to attend.



#### **Easter Triduum**

The *Triduum* brings us into the very heart of our relationship with Jesus, and his Passion, Death and Resurrection. This single feast of three days is the summit of the Church year. Please join your fellow parishioners in the celebration of the *Easter Triduum*, starting with *Holy Thursday Mass*.

#### Mass of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday)

During the *Mass of the Lord's Supper* (March 28 at 7:00pm) the feet of some of our parishioners are washed by the priest, and following the Eucharist there is a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Tabernacle for Exposition and Adoration until 10:00pm. Please bring your bells to ring during the hymn *Glory to God.* There will be NO other Mass on Holy Thursday.

#### **Celebration of the Lord's Passion (Good Friday)**

During the *Good Friday* service (March 29 at 3:00pm) the *Passion* is proclaimed, the Cross of Christ is venerated, and a brief Communion Service takes place. Vigil of the Cross will follow until 8:00pm

#### **Easter Vigil During the Night**

This most sacred Vigil takes place on *Holy Saturday* evening, March 30, at 9:30pm. The *Easter Vigil* has four parts:

The <u>Service of Light</u>: includes the lighting of the new fire, the Easter Candle, and the candles of the faithful, and concludes with the singing of the ancient *Exsultet*.

The <u>Liturgy of the Word</u>: when the Church meditates on all the wonderful things God has done for his people from the beginning. (Bring your bells to ring during the singing of the *Glory to God*.

The <u>Liturgy of Baptism</u>: when new members of the Church are reborn in Baptism, and others make the profession of faith and are Confirmed. The remaining faithful also renew their Baptismal promises including the relighting of their own candles from the Easter (Paschal) Candle.

The <u>Liturgy of the Eucharist</u>: when the faithful are called to the Table which the Lord prepared for his people through his death and resurrection.

Easter baskets will be blessed after Mass, and a reception will follow in the Gerein Centre

#### **Easter Sunday**

Mass on *Easter Sunday*, March 31, will be celebrated at 9:00 am. The renewal of Baptiismal promises will take place. Easter Baskets will be blessed after Mass. Coffee, donuts and fellowship to follow in the Gerein Centre.



#### LIVING LENT

Lent has been part of the Church's life for at least the past 1,700 years. It is a time of prayer and penance, of *dying to sin* and of *living for God*.

We seek to put sin out of our lives by uprooting habits and tendencies that are contrary to God's will, a conversion by turning away from sin and turning back to God.

In living for God we are called to praise and prayer, opening our hearts to the Father, living signs of His love for all.

#### **Lenten Works**

We are invited to prepare for Easter by praying more ardently, reading God's Word with more attention, and doing penance.

#### **Penance**

Penance is not a form of punishment but it is rather to discipline ourselves and to live in union with Jesus who suffered to save the world. We offer our penitential actions in obedience to the gospel commands so that our Lord may purify our love for Him and make us stronger in the service of God and the people of God. We freely offer our penances to help make up for sin in our own lives and in the lives of others.

Here are the "Top Ten" forms of penance:

- 1. **Giving up sin**—live the Ten Commandments.
- 2. **Praying**—personal prayer prepares us for the Church's public liturgy. We pray for ourselves and others.
- 3. **Fasting**—cutting down on richness and amount of food and drink.
- 4. **<u>Doing Good Works</u>**—helping other people in a spirit of love.
- 5. **Giving Alms**—We give cheerfully to God by supporting the poor and good works of the Church.
- 6. <u>Abstinence</u>—We give up meat or other desirable food a day or two a week during Lent.
- 7. Carrying out our duties of life—We serve God by living out our vocation in love each day. We are a living sacrifice of offering our daily life through Christ.
- Meditative reading

  —Christians need time to nourish their faith by reading and reflecting, which opens our hearts to the Holy Spirit and allows God's thoughts and ways to influence ours.

9. <u>Controlling our desire for posses-</u> <u>sions</u>—Jesus reminds us that our heart will be wherever our treasure is and to

build up treasures in heaven. Give away our surplus, lessen our wants, share our time, talent and treasure.

10. Controlling our desire for entertainment—Too much noise and too many distractions can dull our taste for the things of God and leave us with no time for the works of the Lord.

So as you can see, penance is both giving up the bad things and living the good ones, and it is our calling to do both every day, but with special intention on Fridays for Jesus' suffering and dving on the cross for us.

Christians need to be a sign of contradiction to the world and to spend more time serving God and others.

For Friday to come alive once more as a day of penance and good works, it must be kept in our homes.

Lord Jesus, our brother,

We praise You for saving us

By dying on the cross

And by rising from the dead.

Help us to share

In Your cross today

And to come to glory with You

For You are our Lord forever. Amen

#### **FAST AND ABSTINENCE**

As Catholics we are obliged to join the Church around the world in the only two days of fast and abstinence— Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

For Catholics aged 14 years and older, every Friday is a day of abstinence from meat.

Until the age of 60 all Catholics are obliged by the law of fasting.

Try the following:

Eat nothing but bread and water for 24 hours.

Only eat dinner, skip breakfast and lunch. Water and drinks are fine.

Skip snacks in between meals. No sugary drinks, like soda or juices. Skip dessert.
